Stormwater Management and Road Improvement Project

Traffic

With the arrival of spring, increasing numbers of cyclists and pedestrians are taking to the streets to enjoy our beautiful neighbourhood. For everyone's comfort and safety, drivers are reminded to observe posted speed limits and to use care when traveling through the neighbourhood. Moms and Dads are also encouraged to remind their kids about the importance of street safety.

Stormwater Management and Road Reconstruction

Construction will begin in the Doncliffe and Forest Glen area imminently. Construction notices from the city were delivered to all residents living in the affected area in early April. We have recently learned that the Donino Avenue and Donino Court portion of the project continues to be delayed as the Toronto Conservation Authority did not approve the city's proposed water outfall plan. City engineers are revising an earlier plan to enlarge the drainage pipes in the Donino Avenue Bridge in order to accommodate increased water outfall. We do not have an update as to a specific start time for construction. However, the city has stated that they anticipate that Donino Avenue, Donino Court, May Tree and Plymbridge Road between May Tree and the top of the "hill" at Hillcrest school will be completed this year. Residents in these areas will be informed by the city well in advance of the start of construction.

Sanitary Sewer Improvements

The bulk of the underground work related to the sanitary sewer improvements is complete. D. M. Robichaud is now undertaking repairs to damaged surface areas related to the project. They have advised that they are on schedule and expect to have completed all work in the neighbourhood by July at the latest. Northwest Corner of Yonge and York Mills:

Last December, David Miller was quoted in The Star stating that the development of the northwest corner of Yonge and York Mills was a priority for the city. The YMVA contacted Councillor Jenkins in order to stay in front of the issue and to begin information gathering. As a result, Councillor Jenkins arranged a meeting attended by himself, the YMVA, the TTC (who currently has jurisdiction over the property), Planning Department staff, St. Andrews Ratepayers and staff from Councillor Karen Stintz office.

It was an informative meeting and we had an opportunity to meet some of the players that may be involved in any future development. Although it is very early going and there are no plans for the site presently, it was confirmed that, due to its desirable location, it will likely be one of the highest priority sites for development in the city. The only thing that might slow down development in the short to medium term would be the economy and the fact that the corner currently operates as a very lucrative parking lot. However, in a sign that development is highly likely, the TTC will soon be passing control of the site over to the newly created Build Toronto, a municipal body that is focused on the development of "surplus" city property.

Suffice to say at this point that there is nothing concrete (pardon the pun) to report. However, we believe this meeting was a positive first step that allowed us to gather some helpful information, to demonstrate that area residents are aware of the issue, to share some insights about the Yonge and York Mills area, and to express our expectation that the city and any future developer will work with residents in order to achieve a sensitive and responsive development at the northwest corner. Next steps will be to contact other neighbouring ratepayer groups to set up a working group and to keep our eye on the ball as Build Toronto gets established (its first CEO starts on May 11) and as the land is handed over to Build Toronto.

House Numbers

After a recent emergency response on York Valley and during their regular drives through the neighbourhood, Toronto Emergency Services advised us of their concern that many homes in the Valley either have no house numbers or they have house numbers that are difficult to see from the street. EMS has asked us to remind residents that having clearly visible house numbers on all homes is vitally important to ensure a rapid emergency response when needed. They noted that the large number of poorly numbered homes in the valley could add wasteful minutes to an emergency response time. EMS requests that all homeowners look objectively at their house numbers from the

street to ensure that they are clearly visible at all times of day or night and in all seasons. For those that do not have a house number or have a house number that is not clearly visible, EMS advises that new, well placed, adequately sized numbers should be installed.
