We are pleased to include in this year's nominations for election as Officer/Director a nominee with an additional portfolio: Louise Sugar is nominated as Secretary; and as Other Directors two nominees with revised portfolios: Dan Mida and Steve Morson are nominated as Co-Chairs of the Development Committee. Brief biographical notes on the Members proposed for election are set out below:

Nick Dhillon – Nick grew up in Hoggs Hollow, where his parents moved 58 years ago. He and his family now live on the "other side of the river". Nick has spent most of his career in the heavy engineering construction business, and mining equipment business. Nick has been Chair and President of the YMVA Board for three years, and a member of the Board since 2017.

Louise Sugar – Louise has been a member of the YMVA Board since the beginning of the storm water installation and roads reconstruction project in Hogg's Hollow. Louise has acted as liaison between residents and the City. Louise and her family have lived in Hogg's Hollow for 20 years.

Kocho Cumandra – Kocho and his family have been in love with Hogg's Hollow for a long time, and bought their dream home on Donwoods Drive 13 years ago. Slowing down from a dental career, Kocho is volunteering his time to support our community and to meet more wonderful neighbours in the process. Kocho joined the Board in 2022.

Jonson Sun – Jonson is the President of a merchant bank with a focus on M&A and advisory services, as part of a group of financial services companies that he co-founded in 2012. Jonson previously served as CEO of a merchant bank that he co-founded. Jonson and his wife have lived in the Valley since 2017, and Jonson joined the YMVA Board in 2018.

Chris Hewat – Chris is the Past Chair and President of the YMVA Board, and joined the Board in 2010. Chris is a corporate lawyer, focusing on mergers and acquisitions, financing and corporate governance. He and his family have lived in the Valley since 2001.

Annie Katsiris – Annie's family has lived on Plymbridge for almost 27 years. She has actively volunteered for the Neighbourhood Activity Group (NAG) since she and her daughters took over the family home 17 years ago, and has been Chair of the NAG for the past 9 years. Annie joined the YMVA Board in the early 2010's

Laura Lamarche – Laura has lived in Hoggs Hollow for 31 years. She has served on the YMVA Board in the past and has been involved in many of the neighbourhood's activities. She initially worked at IBM and Microsoft, and left her career to raise her family. For the past 13 years, she has been involved in a number of volunteer positions. In addition, Laura's new focus is the Hogg's Hollow Tree Watch initiative. Laura rejoined the Board in 2021, having previously been a member in the late 1990's.

Dan Mida – Dan has retired from his 34 year career as an investment banker based in Toronto. He and his family have lived in the Valley since 1993, and he joined the Board in 2018. Dan is a member of the YMVA's Development Committee.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT Nick Dhillon

To begin, on behalf of the Hogg's Hollow community, I'd like to thank the members of your York Mills Valley Association (YMVA) Board of Directors (Board) for their dedicated and tireless efforts this past year.

In 2024, the YMVA's activities continued at normal levels, including the Valley Fair (at the York Mills Park). Please refer to the Reports below for details on the YMVA's activities in this past year.

One matter on the radar for the YMVA was the proposed re-development of the Agricola Church property at 25 Old York Mills Road (at the corner of Campbell Crescent). The YMVA opposed this development at the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT). Unfortunately, the OLT decided in favour of the developer. As such, the developer can proceed with a 12 storey condominium at that location.

Another matter which popped back on the radar for the YMVA was the proposed development at 4050 Yonge Street (at the corner of Wilson Avenue). The YMVA, in conjunction with other Residents' Associations, opposed this development, and eventually settled with the developer on a revised scope. However, it now appears that the developer has been able to increase the scope without the knowledge of the YMVA. The YMVA is now taking another look at this matter.

It is noted that we are also monitoring a potential issue on the edge of our neighbourhood, adjacent to 23 Beechwood Avenue.

As indicated in the 2024 Financials (see below), the YMVA continues to have significant funds to take on other matters of major significance, or to pursue improvements in the Valley.

In the past few years, it has been a challenge to get newish residents in Hogg's Hollow to join the YMVA, and to attend the numerous activities that our volunteers work hard to organize and host. We request you to reach out to your neighbours, to encourage them to get involved and to come out to enjoy all that we have to offer.

We look forward to seeing you at this year's Annual General Meeting (AGM), and wish you all the best this holiday season.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Our volunteer Development Committee's primary objective is to help preserve the unique, natural character of our neighbourhood and support the neighbourhood in three important ways:

- 1. Evaluating and commenting on new construction proposals submitted to the Committee of Adjustment (CoA) and other related planning progressions;
- 2. Acting as a resource to assist neighbours in navigating through development-related issues; and
- 3. Providing a forum to organize efforts around broader neighbourhood development issues throughout the City.

The Development Committee is currently composed of 7 volunteer residents with a diversity of background experience within the building and real estate professions, as well as non-industry members. By taking a balanced approach in evaluating individual proposals, the Development Committee supports reasonable evolution in building standards and tastes, while raising concerns about individual projects that may have a significant negative impact on the neighbourhood. We also aim to facilitate broader neighbourhood involvement with development-related issues.

What the Development Committee does throughout the Year

- 1. We provide a strong voice on behalf of our residents to municipal and provincial authorities in matters relating to new developments, such as CoA, the Toronto Official Plan amendments, and Ravine Guidelines.
- 2. Through our membership in the Federation of North Toronto Residents' Associations (FoNTRA) and in collaboration with the Confederation of Resident & Ratepayer Associations in Toronto (CORRA), we join other local Neighbourhood Associations to protect the integrity of North York neighbourhoods against harmful legislation changes.
- 3. We review each CoA application circulated within the YMVA boundaries to ensure it corresponds to our neighbourhood development guidelines and maintains the integral character of our neighbourhood, and in particular, assessing if it would set a negative precedent for future development in the Valley, or otherwise negatively affect Valley residents.
- 4. We provide our residents with direction as to how to engage with their neighbours and navigate individual applications to the CoA or appeals to the Toronto Local Appeal Body (TLAB).

While the YMVA may make submissions and, if available, a member of the YMVA may attend CoA or TLAB hearings, including as a Participant, in order to express the views of the YMVA in respect of a development proposal, the YMVA does not typically seek status as a Party unless there is risk of a substantial impact to the neighbourhood's infrastructure. This reflects the reality that we do not have both the personal and financial resources to commit to all developments even if the Development Committee may conclude that opposition is appropriate. As has been the case in the past, Neighbours that are directly impacted by a proposed development must continue to oppose it on their own (or with other neighbours).

On major neighbourhood affecting matters, the YMVA also engages at the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT).

Developments in 2024

In 2024, the Development Committee reviewed a number of applications to the CoA. The irregularity of lots in the Valley sometimes triggers the need for minor variance applications to the CoA. Unfortunately there continued to be some CofA applications where the variances being sought were not perceived to be minor in the view of the Development Committee. Generally these applications prioritized maximizing the footprint of the house and hardscape, while prospectively impacting negatively the character of the street, eroding green space, and creating negative building precedents for future buildings within the Valley.

Over the last year, the Development Committee identified concerns with individual Minor Variances proposed in several applications, and over the course of the year, individual members of our Committee conversed with the Home Owners, Designers/Agents, and local Neighbours to assist in facilitating open communication between residents regarding new developments. The Development Committee made several submissions to the CofA in opposition to Applications.

In addition to opposition in the past year to certain proposed residential developments and to a development proposal for 25 Old York Mills Road (site of Agricola Finnish Lutheran Church), the Development Committee and YMVA have reviewed and engaged with neighbours for the following addresses where Applications were initiated in 2024:

- 14 Green Valley
- 2 Campbell Crescent
- 23 Beechwood

What to Do?

Since 2022, decisions rendered by the CofA have been largely favourable to Applicants due to an inability for neighbours to appeal a decision, thereby increasing the need for homeowners to evaluate CofA notices in a timely and effective manner.

If you receive a notice from the CoA and have questions about a new build project near you, we encourage you to contact one of the members of the Development Committee to review the application and highlight the areas of greatest concern. Residents are also encouraged to speak with the Applicant (or their Agent) directly to review the application in advance of the hearing date. One of the members of the Development Committee may also be available to participate in the discussion if a meeting is arranged with advanced notice. An individual meeting with the owner of a development can assist in clarifying any ambiguity surrounding an application, and in some instances, the owners may offer to make modifications to address individual concerns in advance of the hearing.

ENVIRONMENT AND BEAUTIFICATION REPORT

This year's Valley Clean Up was held on Saturday, April 20th, 2024. This was the continuation of a more than 25 year long tradition in our neighbourhood and we are grateful to neighbours who came out to help. Along with picking up litter, a lot of goutweed was dug up and pulled out in the Millstone Parkette.

We continued to make posters for York Mills Valley Park and Doncliffe Road to keep our community informed of upcoming events. The tulip, daffodil and scilla bulbs that we planted last year in the flowerbeds around these posters bloomed and spread this spring. They looked lovely.

Our initiatives for next year include further weeding and beatification of Knightswood Parkette. We are also working on the introduction of Little Libraries to our neighbourhood.

Thank you to those who have added a donation to the Beautification Fund when renewing their YMVA Membership this year. It's much appreciated and will be put to good strategic use with your input. We welcome all your suggestions on how to add to our Country in the City.

COMMUNITY SAFETY REPORT

Our Neighbourhood Watch Group has grown from 171 members last year to 186 today. This group of committed neighbours has been effective in keeping community members informed of safety concerns affecting Hoggs Hollow. In 2024, there have been 29 emails sent out regarding concerning incidents in the Valley, up from 21 last year.

The majority of emails have been related to prowlers and unknown people videotaping homes. There have been some emails regarding wildlife and others offering information on safety measures and recommendations. However, over the past year, there have been an estimated six very concerning incidents where intruders broke into homes, often in search of car keys. Police have been called and have canvassed neighbours who may have seen or heard something, as well as for video footage from security cameras.

In addition to sharing information and a sense of community, another consideration for enhancing neighbourhood safety is the idea of groups of homeowners hiring private security. Eva Lin has taken the lead on this and has provided the following information:

"Currently we have 35 families in total interested! 27 of the 35 are agreeable to a \$300 monthly budget, and 8 are agreed able to a \$200 monthly budget. We just need 33 families at the \$300 level or 50 families at the \$200 level to kick start this. So, \$300 level is more realistic at the moment, and we would love to attract 7 more families to join! Once this initiative is started, more people can still join and will only lower the monthly costs can be for everyone!"

Thank you to everyone who has reached out with information or concerns, and to Eva Lin for her work on private security.

Schedule A

York Mills Valley Association 84th Annual General Meeting Saturday, January 13, 2024 9:30 A.M. – 11:30A.M. Agricola Church

Nick Dhillon, President of the York Mills Valley Association (YMVA), acted as Chair of the Annual General Meeting (Meeting), and Kocho Cumandra, Secretary of the YMVA, acted as Secretary of the Meeting. Nick Dhillon called the Meeting to order.

1. Minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting

Upon motion duly made, seconded and approved unanimously, the minutes of the Annual General Meeting of Members of the YMVA held on December 10, 2022 were approved.

2. Election of Directors and Officers

Nick Dhillon introduced the current directors of the YMVA in attendance, and indicated that Vito Cassano and Steve Morson had agreed to serve as new Members of the board of directors of the YMVA.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and approved unanimously, the directors and officers proposed for election as set forth in the Notice of Meeting were elected and proposed officers appointed, as follows:

Nick Dhillon recognized the Board Members (especially Chris Hewat) for contributions this past year.

[Post Meeting note: Nick Dillon recognized Simon Levy for his many years of contributions.]

3. Financial Report

Nick Dhillon provided a summary report on the financial results of the YMVA for the year ended October 31, 2023. Mr. Dhillon advised the Meeting that revenue from interest income had increased relative to the prior year, while expenses had increased, primarily as a result of professional fees incurred to oppose proposed developments at 4050 Yonge Street and the Agricola Church. The YMVA had approximately \$516,000 in investments as at October 31, 2023, reflecting an increase over last year.

Nick Dhillon discussed the requirement under the Ontario Not-For-Profit Corporations Act ("**ONCA**") for Members to pass an extraordinary resolution, requiring approval by a vote of at least 80% of the votes cast at the Meeting, to provide for no audit or review engagement in respect of the YMVA's financial statements for the current fiscal year.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and approved unanimously,

RESOLVED as an extraordinary resolution that: no auditor be appointed, and that there be no audit or review engagement in respect of the YMVA's financial statements as of and for the year ending October 31, 2024.

4. Amendment of YMVA Articles and By-laws

Chris Hewat reviewed the requirement under the ONCA for the YMVA to amend its constitution (which are Letters Patent issued in 1977, and are now referred to under ONCA as "Articles") to bring it into compliance with ONCA by October 2024, as discussed in the AGM Notice.

Chris Hewat reviewed the proposed amendments to the Articles, including provisions dealing with the assets of the YMVA being provided to charity in the event of dissolution of the YMVA and the absence of a successor.

Chris Hewat indicated that it was also advisable to make certain amendments to the YMVA's Articles and By-laws to update them to reflect the YMVA's current scope of activities, and to clarify and/or improve certain provisions. The proposed By-laws provide for exclusion of occupants of multi-residential buildings from membership in the YMVA, consistent with past practice of the YMVA, other than those located on Cole Milway or Scotch Elmway, which were grandfathered.

Amendment of Articles

Members passed a special resolution, requiring approval by a vote of at least two-thirds of the votes cast at the Meeting, approving the proposed amendment of the Articles of the YMVA, as follows:

Upon motion duly made, seconded and approved unanimously,

RESOLVED as a special resolution that:

1. The YMVA amend its Articles as set forth in the proposed articles of amendment attached as Schedule C to this Notice of Meeting in accordance with the *Not-For-Profit Corporations Act* (Ontario).

- 2. The Board of Directors may revoke the resolution before it is acted on without further approval of the Members.
- Any director or officer of the YMVA is hereby authorized to do all things and execute all instruments and documents necessary or desirable to carry out the foregoing.

Amendment and Restatement of the By-Laws

Members passed a resolution approving the proposed amendment and restatement of the By-Laws of the YMVA, as follows:

Upon motion duly made, seconded and approved unanimously,

RESOLVED that: the amendment and restatement of By-law No. 1, being a by-law relating generally to the transaction of the business and affairs of the YMVA, in the form of Schedule D to this Notice of Meeting, is approved without variation in accordance with the *Not-For-Profit Corporations Act* (Ontario).

Authorization of Board to Fix Number of Directors

Members approved a special resolution authorizing the Board to fix the number of directors, as follows:

Upon motion duly made, seconded and approved unanimously,

RESOLVED as a special resolution that:

- The Board of Directors of the YMVA is hereby authorized to determine the number of directors to be elected at any annual meeting of the members held from time to time from within the minimum number and maximum number specified in the Articles of the YMVA.
- 2. The foregoing resolution shall be effective upon the amendment of the Articles in accordance with such resolution as may be approved at the Meeting.

5. Rob Oliphant, MP; Stephanie Bowman, MPP; and Jaye Robinson, Councillor

Ms Bowman and Mr, Oliphant addressed the Meeting and answered questions of Members in an open forum.

Ms Bowman commented on Bill 23 and the removal of residents' ability to participate in or challenge development decisions affecting their neighbourhoods, and expanded "as of right" development rights for certain residential developments; and efforts to pass a private members' bill to protect mature trees; and the continuing criminal investigation of greenbelt violations.

Mr. Oliphant discussed the City budget and federal assistance; the federal government's investment of \$6 billion to assist with waste water restoration of the mouth of the Don River; and issues addressing affordability such as higher inflation and housing shortages.

Ms Robinson did not attend the Meeting, but provided a written update (attached).

6. Committee Reports

Storm Water and Road Development Report

In Louise Sugar's absence, Nick Dhillon provided a report on her behalf, indicating a traffic study will be completed to consider any further traffic calming measures including the possible addition of speed bumps on Donwoods, and a uniform 30 km/hr speed limit.

Development Committee Report

In Diana Salerno's absence, Nick Dhillon provided a report on behalf the Development Committee. Nine developments were addressed, with one success. With the passage of Bill 23 and the City wanting to densify, City opposition to proposed developments is limited.

Nick Dhillon reviewed the status of the proposed Agricola Church Development at the corner of Old York Mills Road and Campbell Crescent that was intended to incorporate a 12-storey condo. The YMVA had engaged counsel, a planning consultant, and traffic consultant to oppose the Church's proposed development, together with the Townhomes of Hogg's Hollow Community Association (THHCA). As the City has not opposed the development, the opposition prospects for success are limited.

Nick Dhillon referred to a road allowance pursuant to a 1912 plan of subdivision, with 12-13 lots behind Beechwood going into the Valley where Maytree intersects York Valley Road. If the owner of the adjacent lot on Beechwood is successful in acquiring the Beechwood lot and developing it, this could lead to lots being developed in the Valley. Graham Alloway, who has been involved with other Beechwood residents in opposing this conveyance, noted that even though the road has had protection for many years, the City is entertaining the prospect of selling the lots. The YMVA will be pursuing this matter with Jaye Robinson's office to support the opposition to any development of the road allowance lots.

Community Safety Report

Ann Bedard reported on the status of community safety. Ann reported that the Community Safety Alert group had grown to 171 members. Over the course of 2023, there had been 21 issues reported including nine break-ins, and car thefts. Ann discussed car thefts and the constrained police force, and the advisability of residents taking security steps to protect their property and vehicles.

Environmental and Beautification Committee Report

Vlasta Samograd reported on efforts made by the Committee in 2023, including the Environmental Clean-up day, and plantings of bulbs in the parks.

Communications Committee Report

Annie Katsiris reported on eblasts having been issued at least monthly, with strong interest (a message open rate of approximately 71%).

Neighbourhood Activity Group Report

Annie Katsiris reported on the number of social events that had resumed in 2023 with very good participation. Annie referred to the Valley Fun Fair which had been a great success at the York Mills park (near the tennis courts), and the Dinner Club being revived.

Annie Katsiris commented that lack of volunteers is affecting the events/activities that are offered. This is concerning for the future of the NAG.

7. Other Business

Nick Dhillon invited the Members to discuss other matters in an open forum.

Nick Dhillon asked if there were any other matters to be discussed at the Meeting. There being none, the Meeting was adjourned.

Good morning. I'd like to start by thanking the York Mills Valley Association for hosting today's AGM. While I regret that I wasn't able to join you, I'm pleased to provide a short update on several City-wide matters and local issues in Hoggs Hollow.

As many of you will know, City staff released the staff-proposed 2024 Operating & Capital Budgets this week, which includes a significant increase to the property tax rate of 9%, 10.5% when combined with the City Building Fund increase. I do not support this proposed increase and will be voting against it at City Council. Before raising taxes, we must do our part to streamline service delivery and find efficiencies at City Hall. Under the new "strong mayor system," Mayor Chow will release her budget on February 1, 2024 and it will be considered by City Council on February 14, 2024. I would encourage all of you to review the proposed Budget and share your feedback with the City as soon as possible. Over the next month, there are several ways for residents to get involved, including a series of Telephone Town Halls and the Budget Committee meeting on January 22 and 23. You can learn more at www.toronto.ca/budget.

On another note, Hoggs Hollow residents remain passionate about protecting the local tree canopy and this issue is one of my top priorities as your City Councillor. In December, Urban Forestry submitted a report to City Council called "*Growing Space for Trees: Protecting and Enhancing the Tree Canopy While Supporting Infill Housing.*" While Toronto's tree canopy is steadily growing, residential infill construction continues to threaten many healthy, mature trees – an issue we are all-too-familiar with in Hoggs Hollow. Of particular concern during the residential infill construction process is the conversion of pervious land – which is capable of supporting tree growth – to impervious land, which could include driveways, patios, or basements. Because trees cannot be planted on impervious land, overdevelopment on residential lots has the potential to significantly limit spaces where we can both sustain and expand our canopy.

In a similar vein, you will be pleased to know that City staff are preparing to report back to the Planning & Housing Committee on my motion regarding the impacts of Iceberg Houses in 2024. Many of the aforementioned concerns related to impervious land are closely tied to Iceberg Houses and City staff are considering these matters holistically. Like you, I have been anticipating an update on this important issue and look forward to the upcoming Staff Report.

Ranging from residential infill to major applications, development continues to be top-of-mind in many Ward 15 – Don Valley West communities. In the case of 25 Old York Mills Road, the YMVA ensured that the community's interests were represented at every step of the Ontario Land Tribunal proceedings – up to the full merit hearing. As you know, I voted against the applicant's settlement offer at City Council because I was and continue to be deeply concerned by the lack of meaningful engagement with the community since the file was appealed. While the process can be discouraging, I am very thankful for the YMVA's continued partnership on development files in Hogg's Hollow.

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Recently, there have been several articles in the Toronto Star about the concerning impacts of the *Provincial Bill 23 – More Homes Built Faster Act* on protections for heritage properties. One of the lesser-known impacts of Bill 23 is that it weakens the *Ontario Heritage Act* by eliminating the protection of "listed" properties – a heritage status that requires the owner to provide advance notice if demolition or redevelopment is planned. Unfortunately, *Bill 23* introduced a **two-year deadline** (which is coming up at the end of 2024) for all listed properties to be designated, after which point they would be removed from the Provincial register. Delisted properties would be subject to a five-year waiting period before they can be added back onto the register, during which time they would be unprotected. Heritage Planning staff are expected to submit a final report to City Council with recommendations on strategies and next steps before the end of this year.

Finally, construction on the Hoggs Hollow Environmental Assessment (EA) is wrapping up and many of the streets in our neighbourhood have been completely resurfaced. As a community, we worked together to finalize many aspects of the EA, including the installation of speed humps on Brookfield Road and Donino Avenue. This past fall, my team and I also engaged with local neighbours and City staff to ensure the proper restoration of driveways and boulevards on Brookfield Road when conditions permit work to continue this spring.
